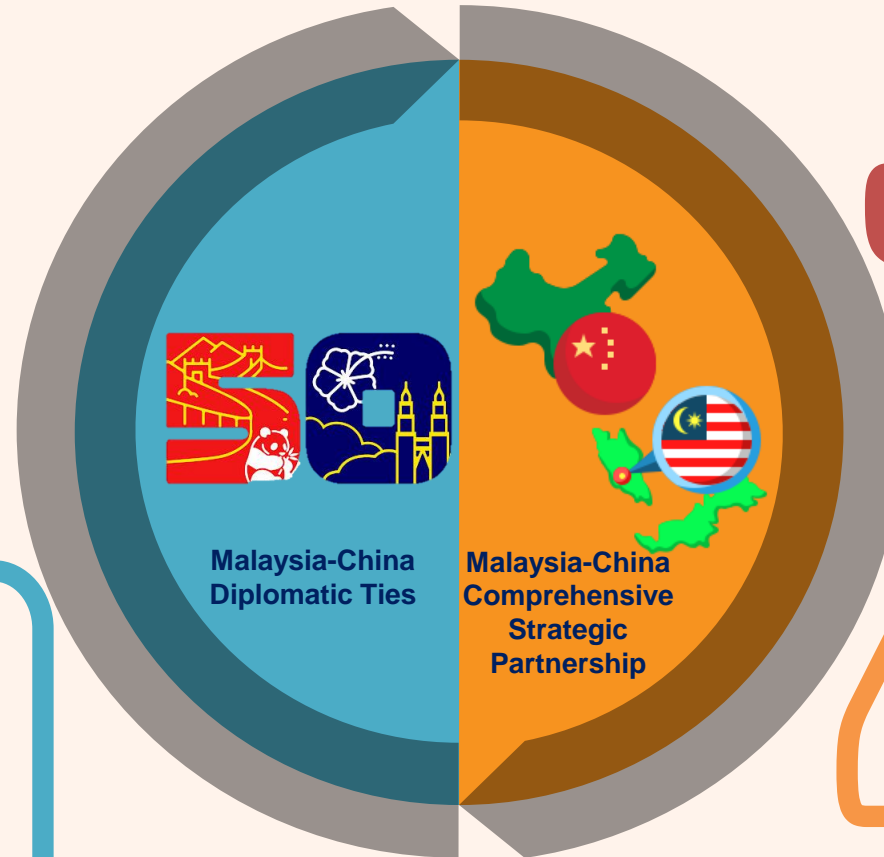

The evolution of Malaysia-China bilateral relations under different Prime Minister

2nd Prime Minister

- Exemplary contribution in initiating diplomatic ties with China on 31 May 1974
- Laying the path towards a milestone in normalizing Malaysia-China bilateral relations.



Tun Haji Abdul Razak

1970-1976

6th Prime Minister

- Elevated and upgraded to a Comprehensive Strategic Partnership in 2013.
- Supported China's Belt and Road Initiative.
- Expanded economic and trade cooperation in industrial/manufacturing, automobile, transportation, information, communication and technology (ICT), education and financial services.



Dato'Sri Najib Tun Razak

2009-2018

4th & 7th Prime Minister

- Double-down efforts on economic cooperation and investments.
- China became a full dialogue partner with ASEAN in 1996.
- Supported China's accession into the WTO in 2001.
- ASEAN-China Free Trade Area (ACFTA) agreement was signed on 5 November 2003; upgraded to ACFTA 2.0 in 2008, and is currently negotiating for ACFTA 3.0.
- Great interests in China's remarkable development in the fields of digitalization, e-commerce, automobile and smart agriculture.

10th Prime Minister

- China an important neighbor. Malaysia would give priority to enhancing relations with Beijing in terms of trade, investment and culture.
- Visited China two times. Secured RM189.84 billion worth of investments and MOUs.
- 12 top exchange visits from Malaysia to China and six highest exchange visits from China to Malaysia.
- Both countries have touched on various bilateral, regional and international issues of mutual importance.

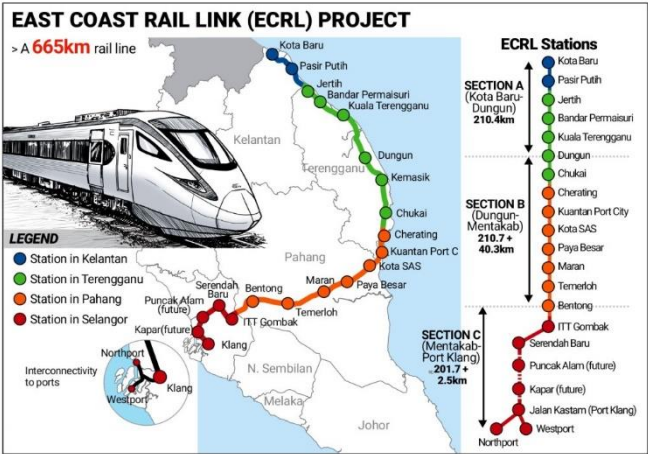

Snapshot of Malaysia-China bilateral trade and investment

Since 2009, China has been Malaysia's largest trading partner for 15 consecutive years in 2023, with total trade value amounting to RM450.8 billion or 17.1% of Malaysia's total external trade.



Exports

China is second largest export destination

2023: RM192.2 billion
(13.5% of Malaysia's total exports)



Malaysia's ODI in China

China:

Ranked 10th in Gross ODI flow

2023: RM1.7 billion (2.0% of total)

Ranked 9th in ODI stock

2023 Q4: RM15.4 billion (2.3% of total)



Imports

China is the largest source of imports

2023: RM258.6 billion
(21.3% of Malaysia's total imports)

Ranked 6th in Gross FDI flow

2023: RM13.3 billion (5.5% of total)

Ranked 7th in FDI stock

2023 Q4: RM34.5 billion (3.7% of total)

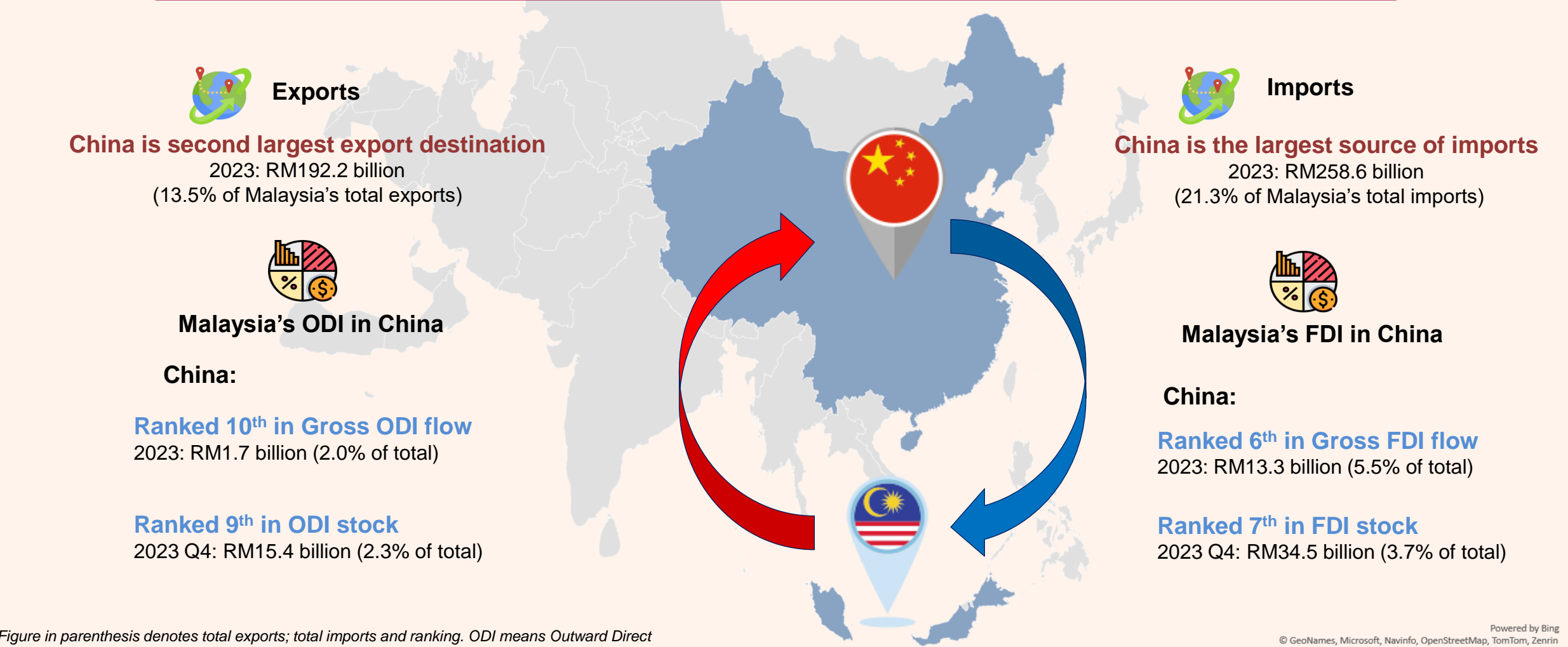
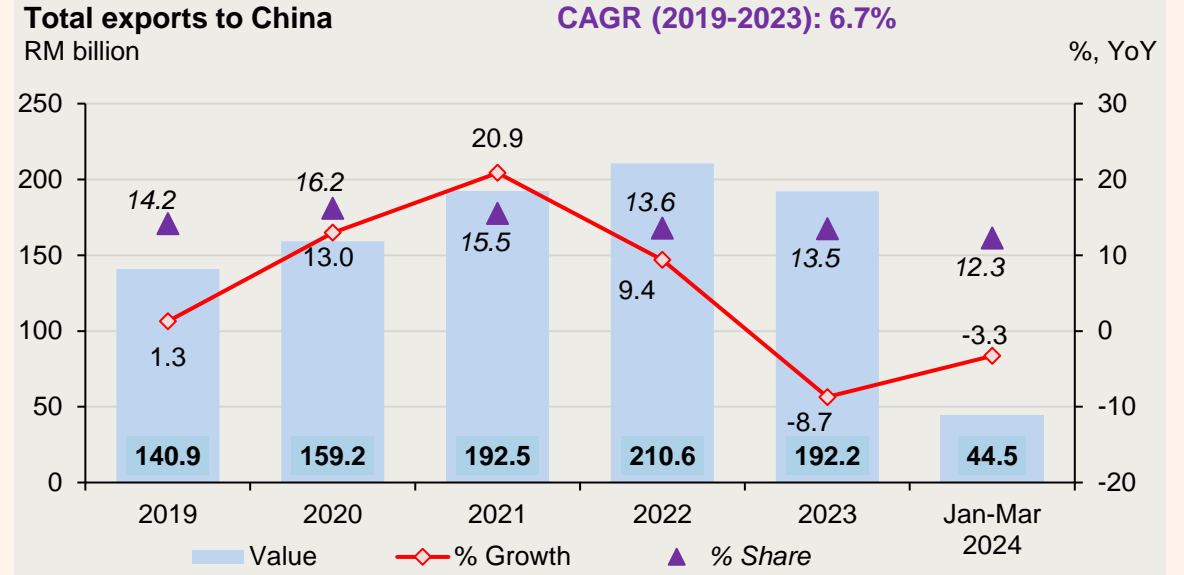
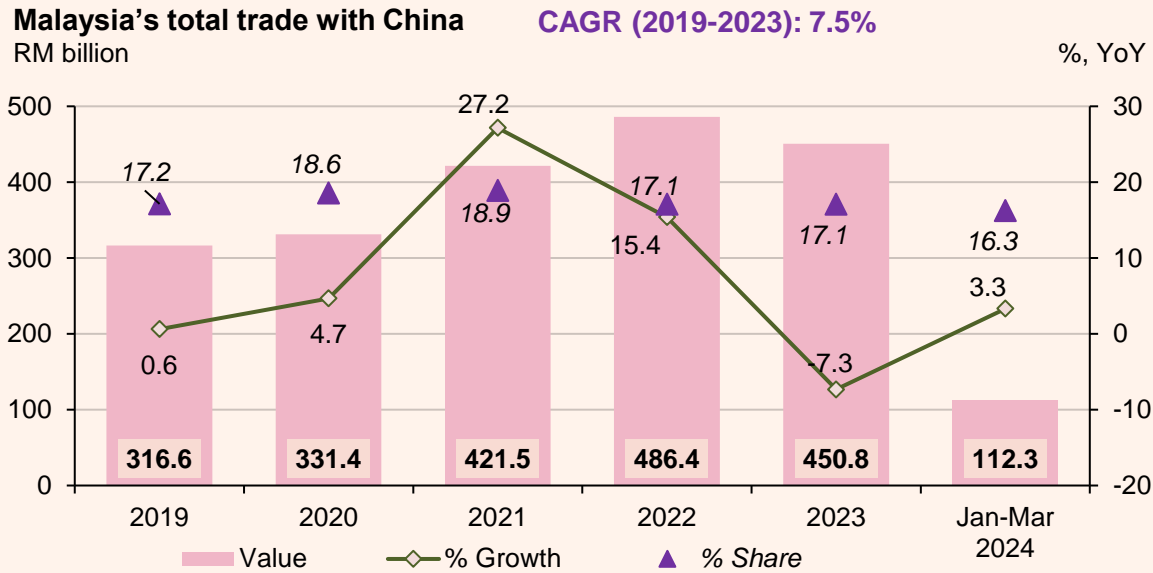

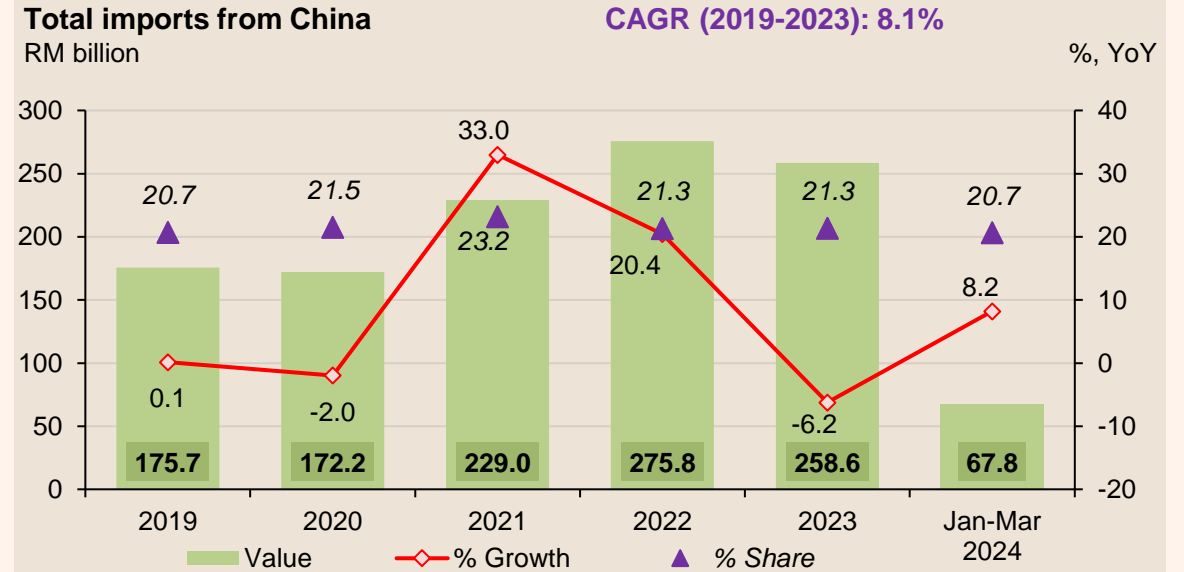
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China remains Malaysia's largest trading partner since 2009

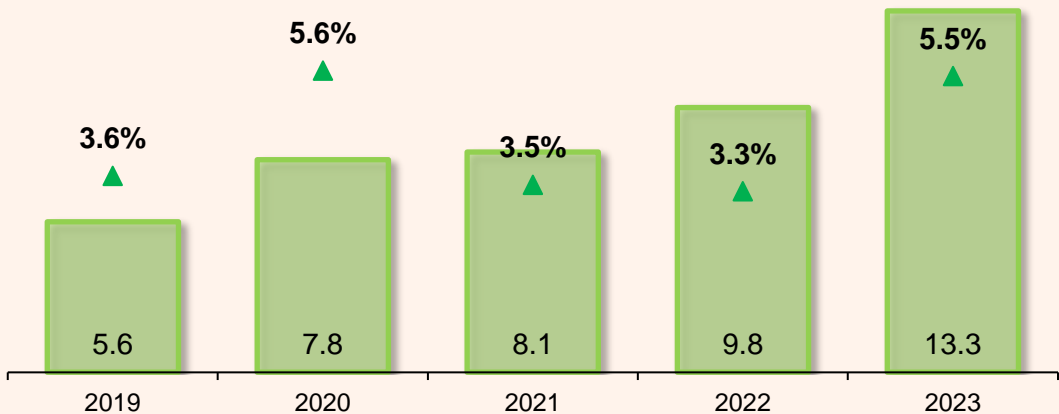

Malaysia-China bilateral investment flows and stock

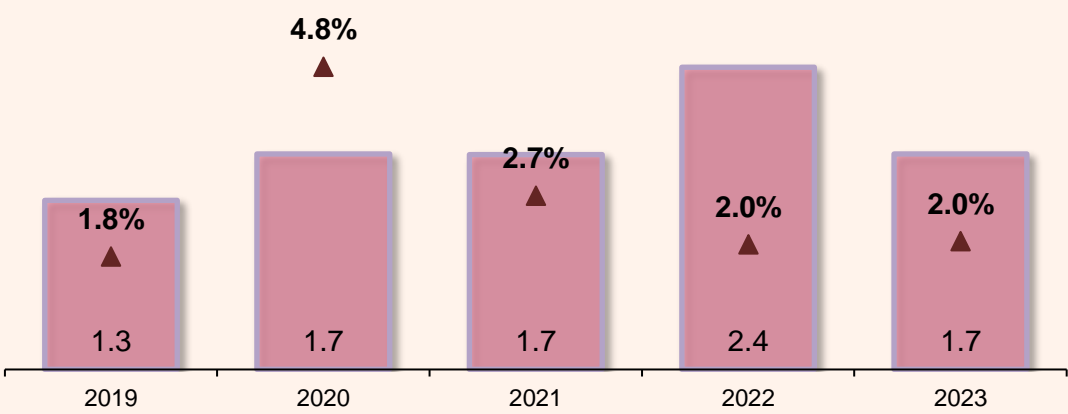
Gross FDI flow from China

■ RM billion ▲ % Share



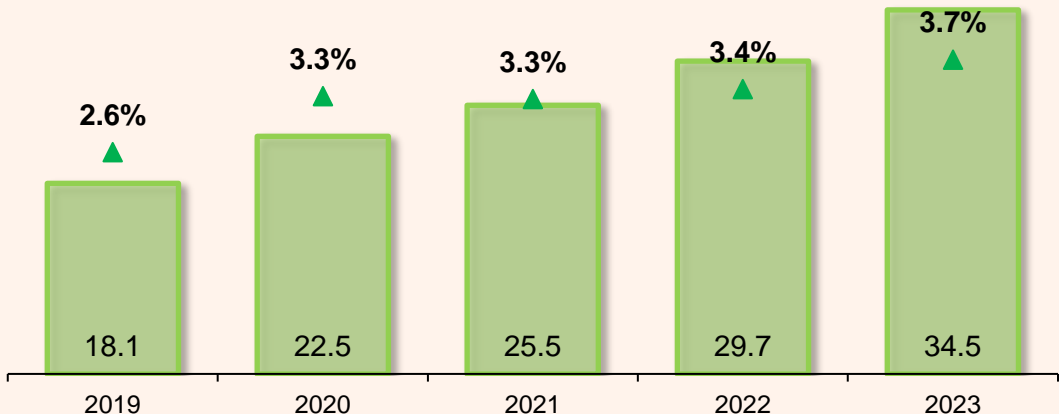
Gross ODI flow to China

■ RM billion ▲ % Share



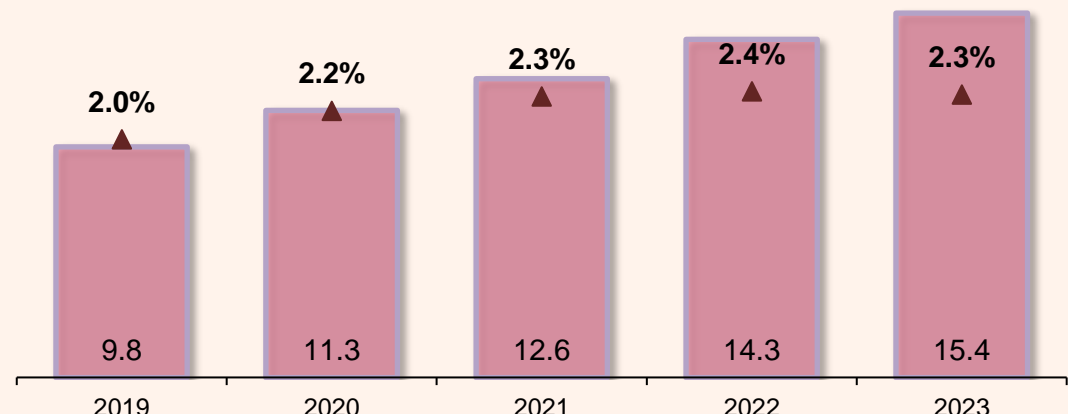
China's FDI stock in Malaysia

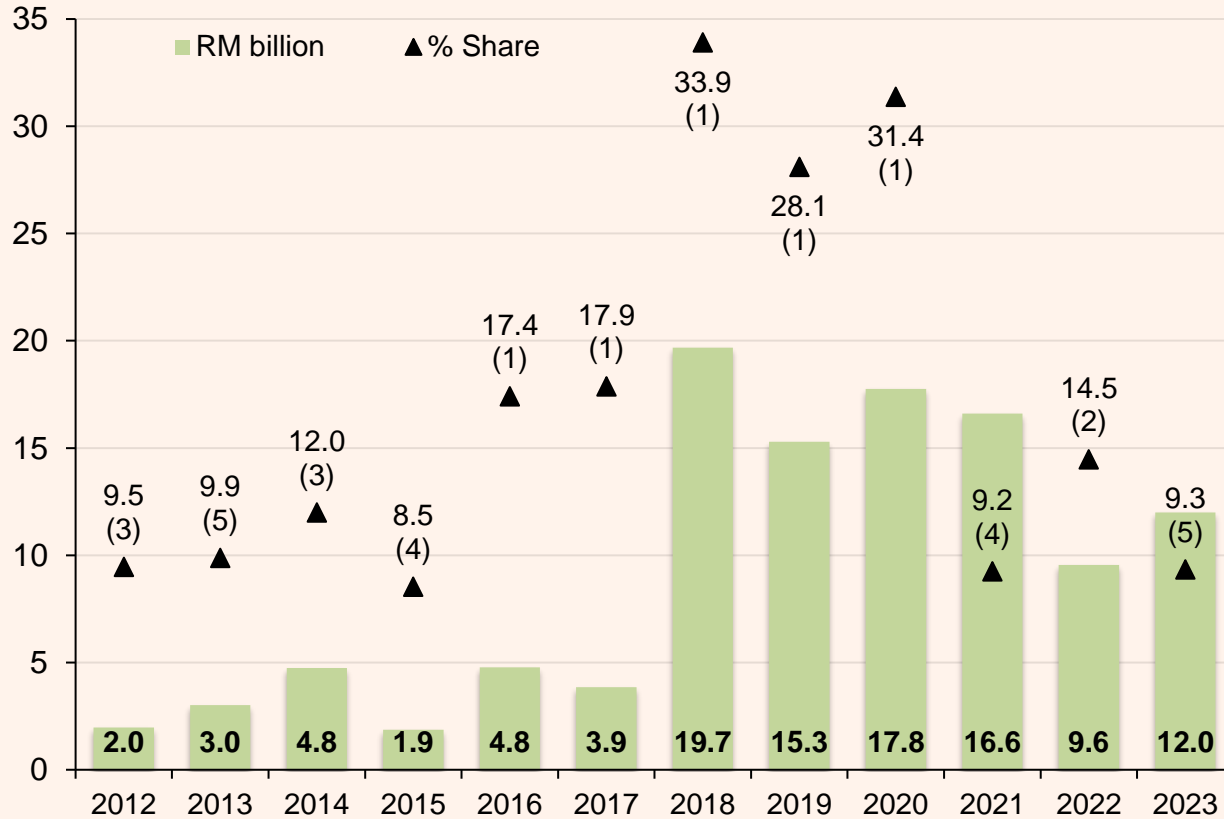

Some recent investment projects in new energy segment

Zhejiang Sinopont Technology Co., Ltd. Establishes Its First Manufacturing Facility Outside China in Perak, Malaysia

Producing solar cell encapsulant film with production capacity of 85 million square meter encapsulants to cover about 10 GW demand. Sinopont's investment in Perak will be implemented in a few phases, and is expected to reach the production capacity of 300 million square meter encapsulants to cover about 30 GW demand.

INV Breaks Ground its RM3.2 Billion Phase 1 Lithium Batteries Separator Project in Penang

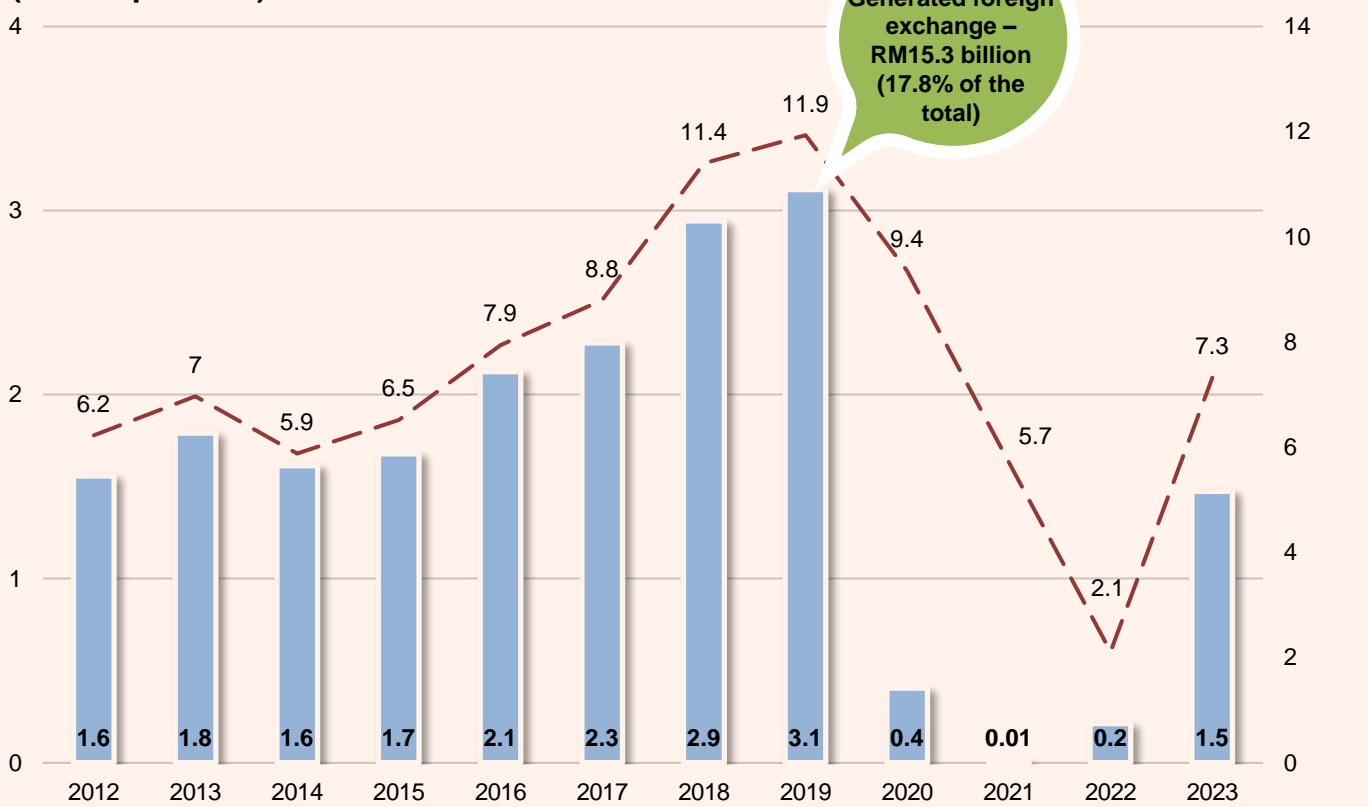
Nestled in the Penang Technology Park, the RM3.2 billion first phase of the venture will have an annual capacity to produce 1.3 billion square meters of wet-process separators and coated separators.

EVE Energy Holds Grounbreaking Ceremony for Its Plant in Kulim, Kedah

The new factory will have an initial investment of USD422 million, focussing on the production of cylindrical lithium-ion batteries to support power tools and electric two-wheelers manufacturing in Malaysia and across Southeast Asia.

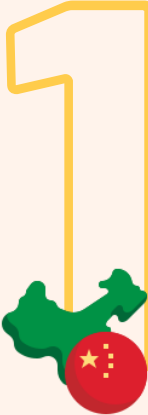
